

- We will begin reading in Acts 21 when Paul and his companions were returning from their third missionary journey. They were traveling towards Jerusalem and stopping to visit believers along the way.

- Yesterday, we read that there was a large crowd in Jerusalem who was against Paul and trying to kill him. The Roman commander saw that the whole city was in an uproar and stopped the crowd from rioting against Paul.

Before you read...

➤ Yesterday, we read that the Roman commander arrested Paul and carried him away from the crowd. But, Paul requested to speak to the people. We are going to skip Paul's speech. He tells the story of how he met Jesus on the road to Damascus. We read this a few weeks ago. You can read his account here again, if you want to in Acts 22:1-21. Paul tells the people that God sent him to tell the Gentiles about Jesus. This made the people very angry because they hated the Gentiles.

Session 2 Monday



Before you read...

Let's take a moment to remember the different events in the life of Paul. First, Paul was a Pharisee who hurt Christians and put them in jail. But then, Paul had an amazing encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus. Paul was saved and became a Christian! Next, God called Paul to become a missionary. We learned about Paul's missionary journeys and how he told Jews and Gentiles about Jesus. During his missionary travels, he also started many churches. Last week, we saw how Paul traveled back to Jerusalem and was arrested. This week, we'll see what happened to Paul as he was on trial.



Read Acts 22:30-23:5

What did Paul tell the Sanhedrin?

Why were they so angry with Paul? (Look back at last week to help you remember.)

Session 2 Tuesday



Before you read...

- This week we are reading about what happened to Paul when he was on trial in Jerusalem.
- Yesterday, we read that Paul was brought before the chief priests and all of the Sanhedrin and told them that he had fulfilled his duty to God in all good conscience.

Session 2 Wednesday



Before you read...

- This week we are reading about what happened to Paul when he was on trial in Jerusalem.
- Yesterday, we read that Paul caused a dispute between the Pharisees and the Sadducees whether the resurrection is true. The commander was afraid Paul would be harmed, so he put Paul in jail. The Lord told Paul to have courage to testify about God in Rome.

Before you read...



Session 3 Monday



Before you read...

- A couple of weeks ago, we learned that Paul was arrested in Jerusalem because the Jewish leaders lied about him. But God was with Paul and protected him. Even when the Jewish leaders planned to kill Paul, God helped Paul safely get to Caesarea through the Roman commander's orders. Paul was in dangerous situations, yet he continued to share the good news. This week, we will learn that while Paul was in prison, he shared the gospel with as many people as he could.
- Today, we will begin where the high priest, Ananias, is making an accusation against Paul to Governor Felix.

Session 3 Wednesday



Before you read...

- This week, we are reading about all the people Paul shared the gospel with while he was in the Roman prison.
- Yesterday, we read that Paul came to Jerusalem to bring gifts to the poor and to present offerings and the Jews have accused him of many things that are not true. Governor Felix kept Paul under guard, but allowed Paul's friends to care for his needs.
- This went on for 2 years! Eventually, Felix was no longer governor and Paul had to make his case before the new governor, Festus. Paul begins this passage making his appeal to Festus.

Before you read...

- This week, we are reading about all the people Paul shared the gospel with while he was in the Roman prison.
- Yesterday, we read that Paul made his defense to Festus and insisted he had done nothing wrong. He ended up appealing to Caesar, who was the Roman emperor. Festus agreed to send him to Caesar.
- Meanwhile, King Agrippa and his wife Bernice came to visit Festus and were interested in what Paul had to say. Festus agreed to have Paul speak to them.

Before you read...

- This week, we are reading about all the people Paul shared the gospel with while he was in the Roman prison.
- Yesterday, we read that Paul spoke to King Agrippa. He told the king that he grew up a Pharisee and followed all of the Jewish Laws and customs. Paul said he has hope in what God has promised and that is why he is on trial.
- Paul continued to tell the king about when he met Jesus on the road to Damascus. As Paul was telling about his experience with Jesus, Governor Festus interrupted him. This is where we will begin reading today.

- This week, we will read that Paul was on his way to Rome by ship when a terrible storm threatened his journey.

- Yesterday, we read that Paul warned the centurion and ship crew that it was too dangerous to sail at that time, but they did not listen to Paul and set sail anyway.

- Yesterday, we read that an angel visited Paul and told him that God would graciously save the lives of all those who sailed with him because God wanted Paul to stand trial before Caesar.

- Yesterday, we read that a snake bit Paul as he was gathering wood. At first the islanders thought he was a murderer, but then when Paul did not suffer any ill effects from the snake bite, the islanders thought he was a god. But, God was protecting Paul because He had a great plan for him.

Before you read...

- Yesterday, we read that Paul healed the father of the island's chief official. After that, many other sick people came to Paul and were healed. God was doing mighty work through Paul even after they were shipwrecked on a random island!

Before you read...

- Yesterday, we read that Paul was allowed to live by himself with a guard instead of being put in prison. Paul told the leaders of the Jews that he had done nothing against their people, but that the Jews in Jerusalem had arrested him anyway.

Session 5 Friday




Before you read...

- We can be like Paul. God has called all of us to share the good news about Jesus. It is our job to tell others about Jesus, but it is God's job to change their hearts. They have to make the choice to follow Him.
